

This was a weekend in which we were able to see our youth serving our church in many capacities and assuring us of their dedication and leadership.

# FROM FATHER GARABED'S DESK......



As we enter a new year ahead, we all wonder what will come our way. Will we be able to a keep pace with life as we did in the past or will things change in our tempo of living? Will we be able and ready to meet new challenges placed before us? The best way to enter new beginnings is not only with *Expectation*, but with *Anticipation*. Though similar in meaning, there is still a difference between these two words and how each affects our actions, our thoughts, our decisions.

Expectations can bring us joy when they are fulfilled and we discover what we are looking for. Or, they can take a turn and bring us unexpected disappointment when we don't find that "gold at the end of the rainbow." Anticipation, however, is more tempered as it leaves the spirit open and ready for all things; the end result is much better because we leave the door of life open, with a bit more wiggle room for possibilities, particularly when we accentuate our lives with positive thoughts, rather than stern and rigid demands.

As we enter the new year ahead, we reflect on examples from the Bible about two important events in the life our Lord: His Birth and His Resurrection. First, the wise men who journeyed from afar following the star in the sky traveled with *Anticipation* in hope of finding the newborn King, Jesus the Messiah. There were perhaps roadblocks for them on the way, but they always left the door open, that 'wiggle room' I mentioned, so as not to allay their hopes. With a positive spirit and desire, they could engage and confront anything on their way to find the Lord, the King, the Hope they were seeking. Nothing would stop them in their pursuit.

Next comes the account at the tomb of our Lord on the day of His Resurrection. When Mary Magdalene met up with the Apostles, Peter, James and John, she told them what happened and that the Lord had Risen from the Dead. Without hesitation they all started to run, not with *Expectation* but with *Anticipation* to see for themselves. We might wonder what was on their minds and in their hearts as they dashed ahead toward the tomb? What was the driving force of their spirits, desires and hopes? It was to see the Lord's Empty Tomb.

Thus, with a positive Hope, both the Wise Men and the Apostles ultimately enjoyed their journeys, the walking or the running, not so much because of what they *Expected*, but because of what they *Anticipated*.

This is how we should greet and enter the New Year ahead...with *Anticipation*, with Faith, with Hope and, above all, with Love, the three crowning virtues of our Christian living. Then we can find joy and peace, and experience God's blessings. It is with Faith in Christ that He will be always with us no matter what. It is with Hope that He and His Holy Spirit will guide our every step in our journey, like the three Kings. It is with Love, like the running of the Apostles, expecting nothing but with Hope anticipating that God will continue to bless our way, being there in the end, where we can rejoice and find the peace and prosperity we look for every day, and that He will be there – born in the manger and risen from the Tomb

The final prayer from the Epistle of James chanted at the conclusion of our Badarak/Liturgy each week sums it up for us beautifully:

Որովհետեւ ամէն բարիք եւ ամէն կատարեալ պարգեւ վերէն՝ քեկմէ կը բխի, ով Հայր Լոյսի: For all good gifts and all perfect bounties come down from above, from Thee, from the Father of Light.

So that Love could be with us, and we could know You. That we could share Love with others. Help us, Father, to hear Your love song in every sunrise, in the chirping of sparrows in our backyards, in the stories of our old folks, and the fantasies of our children.

Help us to stop and listen to Your love songs, so that we may know You better and better.

We rejoice in the world You loved into being.

Thank You for another new year and for new chances every day.

We pray for peace, for light, and for hope, that we might spread them to others.

Forgive us for falling short this past year.

We leave the irreparable past in your hands,

and step out into the unknown new year knowing You will go with us. We accept Your gift of a new year and we rejoice in what's ahead,

depending on You to help us do exactly what You want.

I say it again, we rejoice! In Jesus name, Amen.





# Reflections on Serving the Church ~ Razmig Kalanjian

Excerpt of one of the presentations by altar servers on December 26, 2010 in the sanctuary of St. John's following the Badarak celebrating the Feast of St. Stephen, the First Martyr and Proto-Deacon.

When I was eleven years old, my mother dragged me out of bed and told me that I would begin holding candles, three hours at a time, on Sunday mornings. I gave her such a difficult time. Now seven years later, I am pursuing my faith in Christ. I am on my own journey to Deaconhood, and I have my mother to thank for this.

St. Nersess is a pool of Armenian liturgical knowledge. The atmosphere for the Deacons Training Program is so spiritual.

The classes conducted by Father Daniel, Dr. Matthews, and Dr. Roberta are so insightful and surprisingly enjoyable. I would like to personally thank my *Der Hayr*, Father Garabed, for sending me to this wonderful program for the last two years. I discovered many young men in the church like myself, and I still keep in touch with many of them.

This morning we celebrate the feast of St. Stephen, the Proto-Deacon. We remember and celebrate our own Deacons, men I admire and respect for dedicating their time and their hearts to the altar and to the glory of God, and I thank them for making the atmosphere on our altar that much more Holy. God willing, I will join you as a fellow Deacon serving our Mother Church, and our Heavenly Father.

My life in the Armenian Church is still young. My faith is still tender. But I have a motive to serve; I have a motive to become a Deacon. I have a motive to serve my Mother Church, and to forever serve my Heavenly Father. Being exposed to the fellowship and holiness of Deaconhood will only further these motives. Thank you.



SACRAMENTS

#### Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

#### **Baptisms and Chrismations**

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

#### Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.

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
