AMBASSADOR EVANS ADDRESSES LARGE GATHERING AT ST. JOHN'S MARTYRS' DAY COMMEMORATION

As we approach the 100 year mark of the Armenian Genocide, Armenians in the Diaspora continue their quest to have the government of Turkey take ownership for the killing of 1.5 million Armenians during the first genocide of the 20th century. The year was 1915, an historical event of world history which through ethnic cleansing nearly wiped out the presence of Armenians in their ancestral and present homeland.

Each year Armenian communities throughout the Diaspora acknowledge this historical fact by creating symbolic events of remembrance. This year was no exception as the St. John Armenian Community with great care in planning created appropriate commemorative activities which attracted huge crowds to church services, the memorial dinner and program on Sunday, April 25, 2010 to mark the 95th Commemoration of the Armenian Genocide.

Earlier in the day members of St. John's Church School participated in various portions of the Divine Liturgy. One week earlier, the senior chapter of the local youth group, Armenian Church Youth Organization of America (ACYOA), spearheaded the "Project White Cross," now in its third year, by placing 1,500 crosses on the church lawn to reflect the 1.5 million Armenians who perished in 1915. The crosses were placed in the ground with the assistance of ACYOA and Church School families. The sea of crosses and large banner announcing the 1915 atrocities attracted the attention of motorists as they drove by the church grounds.

After the Divine Liturgy, the congregation joined the clergy as the youth placed a floral wreath at the *Khachkar* Martyrs Monument opposite the church under cloudy skies and a steady drizzle. The large throng of about 500 made their way quickly into the Cultural Hall to share the memorial dinner consisting of baked lamb and wheat (*bulghur*) pilaf. The preparation and serving of the meal was a group effort engaging volunteers from St. John's ACYOA, Church School, Men Society, and Women's Guild.

The program planned for this day of remembrance was one of the most notable as the Mayor of Southfield, Brenda Lawrence, along with United States House members Gary Peters and Thaddeus McCotte, and Vincent Gregory of the Michigan State Legislature were called upon to speak. Deacon Rubik Mailian sang the national anthems of both the United States and Armenia.

And when all were seated, the wedding luncheon was served, a beautifully presented and delectable chicken *piccata*, followed by a lovely dessert of sorbet and pastries.

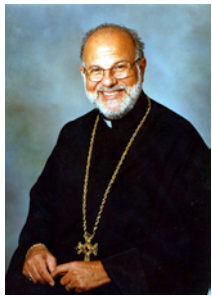

FROM FATHER GARABED'S DESK.....

*Convenience isn't always the best way.
Convenience makes for odd choices.*

Consider this

Faced with difficulty, most of us tend to choose convenience and expediency over sacrifice and integrity. Regrettably this is becoming more and more standard in the world today. We choose the easy way, particularly when the personal costs are likely to be high. Our desire to avoid negative outcomes can stir up odd reactions in us and cause us sometimes to do things that are totally out of character.

Our Lord Jesus triggered some odd choices of convenience and expediency in the political system of Jerusalem. In St. Luke's *Gospel*, he recounts occasions when convenience wins out, for example, when two leaders who had been longtime enemies suddenly became allies and friends. Or when Pontius Pilate, in order to maintain peace and appease an angry crowd, chose to free Barabbas, a murderer and troublemaker and allow the execution of Jesus, the innocent one.

These kinds of sinful tendencies are part of the reason Christ came to die. He wants to save us from opportunistic, self-serving ways of life because ultimately they lead to death. Evil alliances for convenience sake, political manipulation, rigged votes, injustice in politics. Sound familiar? These are all a stench in the nostrils of God, as Isaiah the Prophet writes, "...Sever yourselves from such a man, whose breath is in his nostrils."

As people of faith who believe in the image of God, alive in our souls to do the moral good, we may have to make odd choices that are sometimes not so easy but are the right choices. Our choices should be rooted in Christ-like values of love, truth, and humility, rather than expedience, popularity, selfishness and those comforts that seemingly make things easy. We pray that you make your choices not for convenience but for Christ's sake - that is always the best way.

Martyrs' Day Commemoration - continued from page 1

As part of the commemoration, awards were presented to the winners of the Armenian Genocide Essay Competition, an initiative of the Edgar Hagopian Foundation, now in its third successful year.

A musical interlude was presented by a vocal ensemble composed of St. John's Church School students from the middle school. Led by Deacon Rubik Mailian, they offered two songs, *The Promise of America* by Jill Gallina, and *Hyer Miatsek (Armenians Unite!)* by Kousan Haigazoun.

The keynote address was presented by Hon. John Evans, former United States Ambassador to the Republic of Armenia. During his remarks his respect and admiration for Armenia became vividly evident. In his address Amb. Evans stressed three points which signaled change: 1. United Voice and Witness, Celebrating the Memory of the Victims, and Hope for the Future.

He focused his comments upon the global community's recognition of the Armenian Genocide and stated that gradually Turkey will hear the voice of its own people to admit this heinous atrocity. Amb. Evans noted three events that were taking place in Turkey during April this year. Two were gatherings of Turkish youth protesting the Genocide denials of the present Turkish government, and pressing it to acknowledge the Genocide in order to build better relations with the world of nations. And the third event, occurring for the first time ever, was a conference on the Armenian Genocide held in Ankara. Together, he said, these were signs of hope that the waves of a new generation were openly defying the platform of denial. He stressed that hope can transform a wounded nation to accept its part, be honest with its own citizens and heal itself, as well as honoring the memory of the victims.

An astounding applause to his work, witness and comments concluded the day's program with expressions of gratitude to Amb. Evans and the other speakers of the day, and ending with words of prayer and benediction.

Then the guests went back in time. Beginning with the 1920s, each exquisite vintage bridal gown was the center of a vignette including many mother-of-the-bride gowns, flower girl dresses, ring bearer attire, and of course, grooms. Most of the treasured garments were worn by daughters, granddaughters, or other family members of the original bride. As the models showed off the elegant clothing, a story unfolded about the Women's Guild or Ladies' Auxiliary member who wore the bridal gown on her wedding day many years ago.

As the program moved through the decades from 1920 to the 1980s, the guests observed how the styles changed through the years finding new elegance in each era's fashion trends. As the styles changed, the stories changed as well. In the early years, families visited to introduce prospective couples to see if they liked each other. As the years passed, brides met their future husbands at church or AGBU events, or at college or university. One bride in the WWII era married her U.S. Navy groom in uniform. In each story we were reminded of the Armenian traditions that were handed down, and from each vignette emerged the precious love story of one of our members.

After this fabulous performance, a highly successful raffle was conducted, and over thirty lucky people won prizes including jewelry, baskets of Armenian delicacies, gift certificates to restaurants and movies, china, and much more.

Thank you so much to Paulette Apkarian and her committee. Paulette's vision of our Women's Guild "The Wedding Party" and her committee's hard work provided a sold-out crowd the chance to go back in time, to get a glimpse of the touching stories of some of our members' weddings, and to see the elegant styles of weddings as they changed through the years. It was an outstanding performance and an unforgettable afternoon.

Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

Baptisms and Chrismations

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.
