We reflected on the verses and how it related to our lives in today's world, which built a special bond among all of us, especially as we visited these holy sites. We also talked about leadership, identity, and our future in the Armenian Church.

It was very interesting to witness both the birthplace as well as the Tomb of Christ, both in one day. Experiencing the Holy Land from swimming in the Dead Sea to praying at the Badarak in the Holy Sepulcher at three o'clock in the morning were memories I will never forget. 2011 Summer Fundraising Campaign



A Forgotten Genocide to be Remembered.....

Seeking global recognition and justice for the terrible events of 1915, the Genocide of the Armenians in the Ottoman Empire, has been at the forefront of every Armenian community throughout the world for the past 96 years. Yet there has been a more recent tragedy that likewise has captured the attention of the world, a tragedy that has rendered the Armenians who lived in Azerbaijan to become victims of a merciless plan of ethnic cleansing and genocide as well--a

Forgotten Genocide also in need of resolution and healing.

The Sumgait pogrom (also known as the Sumgait Massacre or February Events) was a pogrom that targeted the Armenian population of the seaside town of Sumgait in Soviet Azerbaijan during February 1988. On February 27, 1988, mobs made up largely of ethnic Azeris formed into groups that attacked and killed Armenians both on the streets and in their apartments. Widespread looting and a general lack of concern from police officers allowed the situation to worsen. The violence in Sumgait was unprecedented in scope in the then Soviet Union and received heavy coverage in the Western media.

The massacres took place during the early stages of the Nagorno-Karabakh independence movement and until today have suffered a fate similar to the tragedy in 1915—a Forgotten Genocide. The official death toll released by the Soviet Procurator General at that time initially exceeded hundreds at first, with many more who perished later. Furthermore, on February 28, a small contingent of local military troops entered the cities of Sumgait and Baku and unsuccessfully attempted to quell the rioting. The situation was finally defused when more professional military units entered with tanks and other armored vehicles one day later. The forces sent by the Azeri government imposed a state of martial law and a curfew to bring the crisis to an end.

It has been 22 years since the terrible days of those pogroms in Azerbaijan and the great losses incurred. In 1988, thousands of innocent lives in Sumgait and Baku were destroyed by the forces of the Azerbaijan government. The native Armenians were forced from their homes, their properties were confiscated, their churches closed, sacred burial grounds and graves were even destroyed, reducing to rubble numerous Khachkar monuments. A viable ethnic community of Armenians, then living peacefully among the Azeris, came to an end.

We are approaching yet another anniversary year of remembering the souls of our brothers and sisters who perished in these pogroms, the newest forgotten genocide. Armenians in Azerbaijan were unwelcome in the lands where they had lived for centuries. The wounds from this tragedy which forced an entire community of Armenians to flee the oppression of the Azeri government have not healed nor have they been forgotten. Many who fled are now in America to begin new lives.

Until now many still suffer the great emotional, spiritual and physical aspects of this 'forgotten genocide.' We pray for them, and especially we pray for those who perished during this recent tragedy.

Many have come to Michigan and have become part of our St. John Armenian Church family. In recognition of their pain and need for healing and the discourse of these events, the Pastor and Parish Council met with members of the Baku Armenian community to discuss how best to commemorate and remember the Armenians who lost their lives in Azerbaijan.

After several meetings, it was decided that an appropriate monument be placed on the grounds of St. John Armenian Church, a Memorial Armenian Cross similar to the existing Khachkar opposite the entrance of the church. Such a monument would become an expression of love in memory of those who died and a testament to the survivors who are now part of our worshipping family.

A parish-wide appeal is now under way to raise the funds needed to acquire this appropriate memorial with the assistance of many members of the Baku Armenian community. With this effort it is our hope that the people of our community will also come to know more about this contemporary and unresolved tragedy.

Remembering the tragedy which the Armenians from Baku have suffered, with the loss of life incurred, and in light of the Medz Yeghern which began on April 24, 1915, we need to commemorate this more recent crime against humanity as well.

We ask you to take part in this community-wide recognition and support this worthwhile project with a tax-deductible donation payable to St. John Armenian Church, indicating "Baku Memorial Fund" in the memo portion of your check. The monument when completed will be appropriately placed close to the existing Khachkar monument which remembers the Genocide of the Armenians in 1915. The date of the dedication is slated for October 23, 2011, which coincides with the 80th Anniversary of St. John Armenian Church.

ACYOA Seniors Bring Home Babayan Cup

The 2011 ACYOA General Assembly and National Sports Weekend was held Memorial Day Weekend in Philadelphia, PA, and our St. John's Chapter was awarded the Babayan Cup after a successful weekend on the basketball court.

Both the men's and women's basketball teams finished in first place in their respective tournaments. For the men, it is St. John's first ACYOA basketball championship since 1987. Our St. John's team defeated a dual chapter team from St. Vartan Cathedral (New York City) and St Leon's (Fairlawn), 40-36, in the Sunday championship. For the women, their victory continues a streak of four-straight first place finishes. St. James of Watertown, last year's winners of the Babayan Cup, captured the volleyball championship.

This is the first time since 1993 that Detroit has been awarded the Cup. The Babayan Cup was initiated in 1974 and is given to the chapter that accumulates the highest number of total points in all of the athletic competitions combined. It was donated by Mrs. Peroz Babayan of Toronto, Canada, in an effort to foster competitive Christian fellowship amongst the ACYOA chapters in the Diocese

It was also announced at the General Assembly that the 2012 event will take place in Chicago, where our ACYOA members will defend the Babayan Cup.

Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

Baptisms and Chrismations

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.
